Australia Post takes its obligation to deliver mail as addressed seriously, and given the unique nature of the circumstances — namely with site access being denied, due to the units being under lockdown and under the control of DHHS and City of Melbourne - met this obligation when we delivered all mail to authorised officers at the site control centre.

Upon subsequently being made aware that the items did not reach their ultimate destination, we raised it with the City of Melbourne and engaged with the sender in good faith to resolve the matter.

s 47 may want to add: The City of Melbourne are an important partner of Australia Post.

Not sure why we would add this next bit.

Australia Post regularly engages with Members of Parliament on a range of issues. This has included engagement with many MPs and Senators regarding the temporary regulatory relief announced by the Federal Government in April 2020.

Further, Australia Post openly provides tours of its facilities to representatives across all levels of government. This has included Senator Hanson at our Queensland facilities, which took place in July, as previously reported by your paper.

I am writing a story which will claim Australia Post threatened to notify police if Melbourne City Council did not allow the delivery of about 100 parcels sent by One Nation's Pauline Hanson to the residents of a locked-down tower block during the height of the recent COVID-19 outbreak.

I understand on Saturday, July 11 - Australia Post contacted Melbourne City Council regarding the delivery of about 100 parcels to 76 Canning Street, North Melbourne.

I believe the parcels contained One Nation paraphernalia and were sent days after Senator Hanson had made comments about the public housing lockdown in Melbourne on the Today show.

I have the following questions. If I could have a response by 4pm today that would be appreciated.

Who directed Nick Macdonald to send an email to Melbourne City Council?

Did the client - in this case Senator Hanson or her office - request Australia Post pursue the issue?

Did Ms Holgate speak to any council official prior or post the email regarding its content? If yes, who did Ms Holgate speak to?

Did Ms Holgate or any other Australia Post employee speak to Pauline Hanson and/or any member of Ms Hanson's staff prior to sending the email?

Had Ms Holgate or any other Australia Post employee spoken to Ms Hanson and/or any member of her staff in the previous month about her voting intention on a Senate disallowance motion on regulatory changes affecting the postal business?

Was Australia Post aware of the context of the parcels prior to reminding Melbourne City Council of its obligation of delivering the mail?

Was Ms Holgate aware of Ms Hanson's comments on the Today show on July 6 prior to requesting the parcels be delivered?

Did Australia Post seek legal intervention over the non-delivery of the parcels?

Where the parcels delivered to the 100-odd united within 76 Canning Street?

Has Australia Post ever given Ms Hanson a tour of its Queensland facilities?

If so, when?
